Dear Mr. Raht:

As promised in my telephone call to you today, I am enclosing herewith an extra copy of the preliminary programme for the meeting in Los Angeles. You will note on Page 5 that we have secured a place on the programme for a short paper describing the work which we have done at Yellowknife. As there was some doubt in my mind in December with regard to whether we would actually have had time to analyze the data, I did not raise the question of including you as co-author of this paper. I have made excellent progress in summarizing the available information and am in a position to have us placed upon the final programme for the meeting. I feel it only proper that you should enjoy the credit to be derived from joint authorship with us in view of the extensive work that you personally have carried out.

I appreciate that this invitation to have you join with us raises a question of policy and hence my telephone call to ask you if you would reach a decision as to the following points:

- (a) Will you be permitted to appear as joint author with us? In this case, of course, the work done by your Company will receive acknowledgment.
- (b) If you are not to join with us as a co-author of this paper, will you please advise me as to whether your Company desires to have its work on the problem acknowledged or remain anonymous.

- (c) In either event, it is my intention to send out a draft of the paper, as I would appreciate having your critical review prior to presentation.
- (d) I do not intend to describe the Con collection system in detail. Please advise of your feelings about this. If you desire to have the system described, I will be glad to include such a description as written by you.
- (e) Finally, I am sure it will be appreciated that as a professional agency in the industrial health field, we have a responsibility to describe to our professional society the work in which we are engaged.
